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### 1: Background:

- 1. To undertake a mapping of services to identify youth specific alcohol and drug treatment, workforce capacity and service gaps; and
- 2. To facilitate the development of a youth alcohol and other drug network for the Northern Territory.

The Northern Territory Council of Social Service Inc (NTCOSS) is a peak body for the social and community sector in the Northern Territory, and a voice for people affected by disadvantage and inequality.

NTCOSS receives some grant monies under the Federal Substance Misuse Service Delivery Grants Fund. Two of the funds objectives are to:

- Facilitate, support or promote opportunities that bring together alcohol and other drug, mental health and other relevant sectors that provide broader community services, and
- Research, source and facilitate appropriate workforce development issues and opportunities.

With these objectives in mind NTCOSS wished to work with the Association of Alcohol and Other Drug Agencies NT (AADANT).

AADANT is the peak body for the non-government alcohol and other drug sector services across the Northern Territory. AADANT is committed to supporting the youth sector to build capacity and increase the opportunities for young people experiencing AOD issues to access youth friendly evidence based alcohol and drug treatment.

The aim of the project is to aid in the identification of agencies that provide youth AOD services, develop and understanding of service/sector capacity, skills and service gaps. Through facilitation of a Youth AOD network AADANT will provide a platform for agencies and workers to share information, identify trends in substance use for young people and identify areas of risk and service gaps.

### 2: Introduction:

The Youth Alcohol and other Drugs Services NT project has been supported by a cross-sectorial Youth Alcohol and Other Drugs Network. Representation was sought from Mental Health, Government AOD department, Youth sector and where appropriate and pertinent, drawn from PHN NT funded Consult Develop Collaborate (CDC 2017) project.

The purpose of this report is to provide a comprehensive picture of current AOD service options available in the Northern Territory to people aged 25 years and under with the aim of highlighting challenges, gaps and barriers to seeking help.

### **Characteristics of Youth Health Services**

In 2011 the World Health Organisation published "Making Health Services Adolescent Friendly" and identified five key principles which must be applied to any youth health service

1: Accessible

Youth are able to obtain the health services that are available.

2: Acceptable

Youth are willing to obtain the health services that are available.

3: Equitable

All youth, not just selected groups, are able to obtain the health services that are available.

4: Appropriate

The right health services (i.e. the ones they need) are provided to them

5: Effective

The right health services are provided in the right way, and make a positive contribution to their health.

This report will use the WHO framework to collate and present sector feedback and recommendations.

### What is Meant by Youth - a working definition.

The Youth AOD services project acknowledges the ambiguity and resulting challenges synonymous with identifying a distinct youth cohort and the provision of support to young people within the community services sector. Many organisations are funded to provide support services to clients 18 years and over and therefore are classified as part of the adult services sector. However, the age range assigned to *youth* can vary from state to state and territory and between sectors, although generally can be considered to apply to anyone over 12 and under the age of 26. This can create a definitional *cross-over or grey area*; any service providing support to people under 26 years of age could be considered as providing services to youth even where the FASA states they are an adult service otherwise and there are no youth-specific support activities in place.

This report provides a regional overview of ALL organisations who work with people 25 years and under (referred to as young people within this report) but acknowledges the definitional ambiguity and highlights where discrete support programs designed specifically for young people exist.

### 3: Methods:

The Agency-specific information presented in this report has, where possible, been gathered via face-to-face consultations and a self-reporting survey (See Appendix A).

### 4: Scope of Consultation

As part of the consultation process AADANT approached agencies providing AOD services and cross sector Youth services across the NT, regardless of funding structure. This service review includes NGO's, government agencies and community controlled health services. Each service was invited to participate in the process via an online survey and then complimenting this, and where possible, AADANT met or conducted phone interviews with senior management to discuss the aims of the project and spend time in the facility.

Whilst this review was ostensibly examining AOD funded services, for the purposes of providing a holistic and accurate picture of current service provision and gaps, Community Safety and Night Patrol services have been included in the report. This is in response to, and an acknowledgement of, the fundamental role night and community patrol workers play in supporting young people and communities experiencing challenges resulting from AOD use. In many instances, it is these services which are the first responders and only local option available for people living in remote communities.

"... as Manager Community Safety with MacDonnell Regional Council, we run our program to be mindful of all Community members and the overall safety of those members holistically - dealing with individuals and groups within a Community who are displaying anti-social behaviours (whether drug, alcohol or mental illness induced etc.), with focus on how this may affect children and their education." ### 4.1 Area Specific review of current Service provision

For the purposes of this report and to enable insight into current service provision for young people within the AOD sector, this review examines each Government Region (and Local Government Areas LGA's within) in the Northern Territory separately. Each region designated below has a service delivery matrix (SDM) which maps the services operating within the designated boundaries and the direct client activities they are engaged in for people under 25. Where agencies are youth only or have youth specific activities within their overall service delivery suite this has been highlighted within the SDM.

- 1: NT Wide
- 2: Darwin Region
- 3: Katherine Region
- 4: Central Australia including Alice Springs
- 5: Other Remote specific
- 7: Additional Youth Specific services across the NT

### 5.0 Key Findings and points of discussion:

### 1: Accessibility

The Northern Territory (NT) in Australia, is 1.421 million square kilometres. With a population of less than 300,000, it is the most sparsely populated area in Australia. The designated regional approach to service provision presents significant challenges to young people seeking assistance and support.

It was generally felt a more concerted effort in data collection and research was needed to support resource allocation into evidenced based best practice when it came to the provision of AOD services to young people.

In particular:

### **Range of Services and locations**

The range of services available in each region or those services able to accept referrals from young people across the NT is limited.

Feedback from the AADANT survey highlights significant gaps in:

Early Intervention and prevention programs
Day and other non-residential support
Family inclusive support

"There are no day programs running offered during the day (for young people). Almost all are on after school or school holidays. Apart from our partnerships through SHAK and YMCA there is nothing else" Brett Taylor, AOD Youth Officer, Amity

### Transport

Due to a lack and range of services in each region <u>and</u> the geographic size of catchment areas the availability and costs associated with getting to services was a barrier for young people. Further, services reported to having to absorb transport costs as it was not a funded activity.

Remote communities rely on services in more regional hubs.

The lack of on-the-ground services in-community results in people either having to leave to seek support or stay and receive little or no continued specialised AOD care.

### 2: Acceptable

Recurrent themes throughout the Youth AOD services consultations and supported through the CDC project was that there are key differences in service delivery design for young people. This is also supported in other youth focused consultations and reports (WHO, JACQ Hackett consulting 2016-2017)

Youth friendly services much be designed with this specific target group in mind in order to be an acceptable place for young people to feel safe. To this end, whilst services may be able to work with people under twenty-five this did not necessarily mean the environment was suitable or acceptable for young people.

### 3: Equitable

The lack of a full range of services in each region results in an inequitable service provision. Young people who lived in rural and remote areas struggle to access a full range of locally-based services. Transport availability and cost are a significant barrier. Families struggle to support a young person to leave community to attend a residential service. Throughout the consultation cross-sector and AOD specific services articulated the need for holistic, biopsychosocial support services to be available in each region and remote area hubs.

Many organizations also highlighted the need for culturally appropriate therapeutic community services such as Bushmob in Alice Springs or WYDAC in Central Australia being offered in regions across the NT.

### 4: Appropriate

Services delivered to young people must be developmentally appropriate and tailored with a focus on psychosocial support rather than solely clinical. Early intervention and prevention and non-mandatory programs were also highlighted as important to avoid detention and other mandatory options.

"You have to break the law to get a service around here" Graham Castine, CEO Kalano Community Association Katherine NT

Holistic and integrated approach with an emphasis on psychosocial support

Family integrated service supported by education and health promotion for families and carers

Co-located services which sat outside of school environments

Opportunity to gain access to services to support co-morbidity or dual disability

"... you have to start with the kids. With the kids we can really make a difference but we are the only service in town who works with kids " Denise Brookes, CEO Holyoake Alice Springs

### 5: Effective

The characteristics and the underpinning principles of practice of effective service provision for young people was identified across key service activity domains:

### 1: Early Intervention and Prevention Programs

- Family Inclusive
- Community Development focused
- > Biopsychosocial and recovery orientated
- Co-located services to support referral pathways
- Peer worker support
- LGBTIQA inclusive

### 2: Detox and withdrawal

- Client driven treatment programs (allowing varying length of programs)
- Outpatient and community based services
- > Tailored services which were not an adjunct to adult services
- Peer worker support
- > Continuity of care post discharge
- > Collaborative biopsychosocial case management
- ➤ LGBTIQA inclusive

### 3: Residential Care

- > Specialist trained staff

- > Safe and supportive (home-like) physical environment

### **Sobering Up Shelter**

The shelter provides overnight accommodation to people under the influence of alcohol or other drugs who have been delivered to the shelter by the Northern Territory Police or the community Night Patrol service.

No self-admissions are accepted. However, shelter staff will refer people to other services that may be able to assist them.

The shelter helps relieve pressure on police and other community resources, and also plays a role in reducing anti-social behaviour in public places. Having safe and secure accommodation also protects people from potential victimisation and violence.

The Sobering Up Shelter service uses a range of approaches to help people with drug and alcohol abuse issues, including brief interventions and referrals to rehabilitation and medical services.

Darwin Sobering-Up Shelter, located in Coconut Grove, is a 32-bed facility.





#### Youth Diversion, Intensive Youth Support Service, Out of Home Care, Youth Emergency Relief

The Youth Diversion Program, Gunbalanya, supports young people through the diversion process using restorative justice principles. This includes Victim offender meetings, Opportunities to remediate the offence, Support in accessing community placements, Diversionary activities, Reintegration support. The project works closely with local elders and young people to ensure the program remains relevant to local young people.

The Intensive Youth Support Service (IYSS) is for children and young people aged between 10 and 17 who have been involved with Territory Families, who are engaging in behaviours that place them at significant risk of further serious or emotional harm.

The intensive support provided focuses on both the individual and family members, and aims to ensure young people are given the tools and support they need to take them into a happy and successful adulthood. The approach builds on Anglicare NT's commitment to working in preventative and innovative ways with young people and their families.

General Residential Care provides care for young people, typically 12 to 18 years under Child Protection Orders. The program is designed for the placement of young people with complex needs and/or behaviours. The program provides a therapeutic environment to assess client needs, stabilise behaviours and transition children into reunification or independent living.

A residential service for sibling and mixed groups of young people 5 – 17 years in the care of the CEO Territory Families that aims to provide stability, continuity and a sense of belonging. The program creates a home like environment where young people have the opportunity to build and maintain relationships, establish connections with their local community and develop interests, skills and self-esteem through participation in a range of activities.

A limited amount of financial assistance and material aid is provided to young people (single, couples, young families) aged 12 - 25 years through offices in Darwin and Palmerston.

The Sobering Up Shelter service is available to people living rough and at risk of harm in the greater Darwin, Palmerston and Katherine areas.

Based on a harm-minimisation model, it provides short-term, non-custodial, safe shelter for intoxicated people over the age of 18.

The shelter provides overnight accommodation to people under the influence of alcohol or other drugs who have been delivered to the shelter by the Northern Territory Police or the community Night Patrol service.

No self-admissions are accepted. However, shelter staff will refer people to other services that may be able to assist them.

The shelter helps relieve pressure on police and other community resources, and also plays a role in reducing anti-social behaviour in public places. Having safe and secure accommodation also protects people from potential victimisation and violence.

The Sobering Up Shelter service uses a range of approaches to help people with drug and alcohol abuse issues, including brief interventions and referrals to rehabilitation and medical services.

Bushmob is a community based service for high risk Young People who use alcohol and other drugs and engage with the youth justice system. Bushmob is described by its funders as either a youth alcohol and other drug service, or Sentenced Youth Camp. It is more accurately described, however, as a therapeutic service for high risk Young People whose complex needs generally include alcohol and other drug use and recidivistic engagement with the youth justice system.

Bushmob's purpose is to assist young people in making positive life choices about alcohol and other drugs, violence, crime and other high risk behaviours. Bushmob operates medium stay residential programs at Alice Springs and Loves Creek Station. Bushmob Adventure Therapy, Media and Community Support Programs which include advocacy, community outreach and large group work are integral components of the residential programs.

Bushmob's scope is limited to providing individualised service, however, its practice is located within the wider systems which empower and enable positive change which includes culture, families and society. Bushmob has developed from the priorities expressed by Indigenous people in the Northern Territory about strengthening youth against high risk behaviours. Its practices are therefore rooted in the community it serves.

The community development ethos enables Bushmob to draw on the cultural and community assets and strengths that exist within Indigenous families and in the Indigenous cultural context as the foundation for its work, and to draw upon wider societal resources. Bushmob's design and methods rest upon program design elements made in response to the complex needs of its highly marginalised target population. In a unique operating context, and using empirically sound theoretical frameworks.

Activities to reduce supply include supporting the use of Low Aromatic Fuel (often known as Opal fuel) and providing advice and support to retailers of high risk products so that they are managed as well as possible.

Activities to reduce the demand centre on providing better alternatives to substance misuse to at risk young people, examples of this work include supporting the development of youth programs as well as training skills development projects.

Youth programs provide recreational and diversionary programs that keep young people busy, engaged and out of trouble. Such programs provide a supported and safe environment where young people have access to assistance with referrals and support, they also provide fun and access to new skills.





The four Youth Development programs support Warlpiri youth in the creation of positive, meaningful futures as individuals and for the benefit of their communities. This occurs through a range of diversionary (youth program, culture and projects) and development (training, education and employment support) programs that develop a positive sense of self, family leadership and culture.

**Level 1** engages young people (5-25 year olds) in a consistent program of positive, healthy and safe diversionary, cultural and project activities, aimed at increasing enjoyment, interests and challenges, whilst correspondingly reducing negative behaviours such as substance misuse or other at risk activity. These activities combine to establish a positive youth culture, that promotes key values such as healthy lifestyles, cultural strength and school attendance.

**Level 2** creates productive and formal life pathways for Warlpiri youth through opportunities from Jaru Trainee membership, Training, Education and Employment:

**Training and Education**: Supports 5 -25 year olds to re-engage in learning and education, through a variety of informal and formal education/training opportunities. Provides young people aged 5-25 with a wide range of informal learning opportunities to promote re-engagement and development of their education, including support to return to school. Involves young people aged 16+ as Jaru youth program trainees, developing work readiness. Provides formal learning through accredited courses.

**Life and Employment Pathways**: Young people aged 16+ are supported to develop employment and life pathways, to participate solidly in community life. Young people who have engaged in Jaru training and education are supported to find further employment, and/or community leadership roles.

The WYDAC Warlpiri Employment Pathway Policy allows for young people to assist the youth program as trainees. Regular and consistent trainees are eligible to be employed as casual or Permanent Part time staff. We will also facilitate employment with other local organisations and mentor new employees.

The Balunu Foundation's healing and therapeutic programs provide hope for Indigenous youth and families by targeting the cycle of disadvantage. Our programs cover health, education, life skills, training, and employment, and maintain a strong emphasis on emotional well-being.

Identity is most critical in strengthening the youth's sense of self-belief and self-worth. The therapeutic aspects of our program help instil a greater emotional balance in participants, which plays an important role in helping the youth make stronger and wiser life choices. We currently operate a six-day healing camp and accommodate up to ten participants per camp program.

Balunu seeks to extend existing program delivery to remote and regional areas and expand program delivery to include specific projects targeting mental health, substance misuse, education, training & employment, suicide prevention and healthy families.

Under the Federal Governments IAS funding program, the Balunu Foundation will begin to deliver youth and family support services to remote and regional communities in the Northern Territory commencing in July 2015. This will include the following regions: Arnhem Land, Barkly Region and Central Australia and the Greater Darwin region.

This project will provide prevention and early intervention services to assist families and communities restore cultural well-being, rebuild family units, promote healing and develop lifeskills to deal with unresolved personal and intergenerational family trauma.

The Homelessness Outreach Support program supports clients participating in the 12 Week Residential Program, to access accommodation when they have completed the program. Workers also support participants who are accommodated under Territory Housing to sustain their current tenancies and assist with community referrals for housing support and information.

CAAPS Volatile Substance Misuse (VSA) 16 week Residential Program aims to assist youth between the ages of 12 to 24 years in treatment for volatile and other substance misuse and education towards healthy lifestyles.

CAAPS AOD 12 Week Residential Program focuses on providing families with a safe and supportive environment to address substance use issues. The Healthy Families program is made up of a range of education sessions and activities that cover substance use, healthy lifestyles, livelihood, cultural sessions, and family relationships including parenting. Participants of the program have access to onsite counselling, specialist counselling, peer support groups, housing and livelihood support. Each client is also assigned a case-manager to help them work towards the goals that they have set during their stay at CAAPS

Children who attend CAAPS with their parents participate in the CAAPS Indigenous Children's Program. Children's workers support parents in engaging school aged children with local schools, developing effective daily routines and increasing parental capacity. The Indigenous Children's Program provides daily activities for children who are not of school age to develop school ready skills and routines, age appropriate protective behaviours as well as a range of fun activities. The Children's Program also runs a homework centre for school aged children and provides children with protective behaviours education as well as school holiday programs through the year. The children's worker also provides support to parents who are in the process of child reunification through the Department of Children and Families.


